

OFF-CAMPUS STUDY 2019-2020 ANNUAL REPORT



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I. Off-Campus Study Summary

Enrollment: Student Participation in OCS. During the 2019-20 academic year, two hundred and thirteen students participated in study abroad for credit. One hundred and sixty-four students participated in semester or year abroad programs: four students studied abroad for the academic year (one on two separate programs), sixty-nine for the fall semester and ninety-one for the spring semester. An additional four students withdrew in January before attending their programs, due to suspended programs as a result of the spread of the COVID-19 pandemic. There were fifty-four participants in short-term abroad programs that were part of on-campus courses offered for credit. The participation rate in the OCS semester/year abroad program was forty-two percent of the 2020 graduating class and the percent of students who received credit is forty-eight percent when participation in embedded study abroad courses is included. This is a three percent increase over the class of 2019.

Due to the pandemic, by March, 2020 all OCS participants were asked to return to their homes. OCS coordinated the return travel of the students, along with any issues pertaining to their completion of studies, and financial concerns.

Access and Inclusion: OCS received approval to pay for student visas and application fees and had intended to pay for passport fees in 2020-21. Paying for passport fees will depend on budget considerations and the ability of students to apply for passports. Pat Martin started a subcommittee of the Beyond the Classroom to discuss access and inclusion concerns.

<u>Affiliation Agreements:</u> Agreements were concluded with CET, College Year in Athens, and Middlebury College.

Assessment of the Abroad Experience: OCS surveyed study abroad participants on their access to mental health resources and funding concerns related to accessing cultural activities. OCS worked with a group of graduate students from the Middlebury Institute for International Studies to review our assessment procedures. OCS will consider how to assess the experience of the OCS spring 2020 students who had to return early due to the pandemic.

<u>Community Engagement</u>: Pat Martin is a member of the Crisis Planning Action Committee, the Administrative Advisory Council, the Beyond the Classroom committees and the Carbon Charge Working Group. Pat Martin served on the committee for a PSRF, and served as a Sustainability Advocate. Pat Martin also served on the COVID-19 Planning Group. Pat Martin and Lotte evaluated applications for Lang summer funding and Pat served on the Pulitzer Student Fellow funding selection committee.

<u>**Domestic Opportunities:**</u> OCS agreed to take over the advising and application procedures for the domestic exchange programs with Middlebury College, Mills College, Pomona College, and

Tufts University, which previously had been handled by the office of the registrar. OCS plans to provide information about the domestic exchanges on the OCS website and will develop an application system using the Terra Dotta software.

Events:

- **1. Major OCS-organized annual events**: Fall Semester: Pre-departure gatherings (orientation) and welcome back gatherings for participants in the semester/year abroad program; Study Abroad Fair; Passport Day; and co-sponsored events with Career Services (Marketing your International Experience) and the Financial Aid office. OCS had to convert all spring semester activities to a virtual format (i.e., promotion, advising and pre-departure activities).
- **2. Campus Events:** OCS participated in campus events organized by admissions and the alumni office, as well as the Summer Opportunities Fair.

Faculty Engagement:

OCS worked closely with faculty who organized and and/or directed the following abroad programs:

<u>Insurance</u>: The CISI insurance policy was in place for 2018-19 and renewed for 2019-20. All students, faculty, and staff in the OCS Travel Registry were enrolled in the CISI insurance plan.

OCS Activities. OCS held a successful "green" study abroad fair and Passport Day. In addition to regularly required orientation sessions, OCS instituted a new requirement for students to attend a workshop or lecture on an appropriate topic to help prepare to live and study abroad. OCS always hosts many representatives from study abroad programs and universities, but additionally hosted visits for a delegation from the University of York, the directors of the Harvard CASA programs in Chile and Argentina, the Executive Director of DIS, and the President of IFSA-Butler. Spring 2020 marked the last semester of the Krakow, Poland program, directed by Art McGarity. OCS had planned an all-campus event in celebration of the international educational exchange programming with partners in Poland by the dance, theater, and engineering, and environmental studies departments and programs, but this was cancelled due to the pandemic.

<u>Professional Engagement and Site Visits:</u> Pat Martin authored a chapter in NAFSA's new book, *Undergraduate Research Abroad*. Her chapter was republished in NAFSA's International Educator magazine. Pat was honored to be nominated by her staff for the Suzanne Welsh award. Pat Martin and Sharlene Garcia attended the annual CIEE conference and Pat Martin attended the Overseas Security Advisory Council Annual Briefing. In addition, she attended the virtual Forum

on Education Abroad conference and the Forum on Education Abroad Standards of Good Practice Institute conference. Pat Martin and Lotte Buiting attended the School for International Training Workshop on Student Health, Safety, and Well-being held at Temple University. Lotte Buiting had a poster session approved "Assessment: Where to Start?" planned for the NAFSA annual conference. It was cancelled due to COVID19. Lotte gave an invited lecture on Leni Riefenstahl's *Triumph of the Will*: History 37/GMST 37. History and Memory: The Holocaust and the Problem of Genocide, co-taught by Hansjakob Werlen and Bob Weinberg (February 5th). Lotte Buiting visited the IFSA program in Merida, and the CIMAT semester program in mathematics in Guanajuato, Mexico, along with Aimee Johnson from the math department. Pat Martin's site visit to the UK and Sweden was curtailed in March due to the pandemic, but she was able to visit University College London, Goldsmith's College, and Queen Mary before having to return to the US. Diana Malick attended the virtual Global Terra Dotta conference.

<u>Promotion of Global Engagement:</u> OCS has discussed the proposed College mission statement with interested faculty, and has encouraged the inclusion of global engagement in the statement. OCS would like to encourage and help facilitate, when possible, faculty connections with global partners. The likelihood of remote means of instruction provides an opportunity to include virtual exchange elements, so that students can engage with students in other countries. OCS has encouraged the communications department to create a global education and engagement portal on the main Swarthmore website.

Risk Management: In addition to COVID-19, there were many safety concerns that affected student travel that had to be monitored and assessed by OCS and the International Travel Risk Management Committee. There was significant social unrest and student protests in many Latin American countries and pro-independence protests in Spain. There was a crackdown on protesters in Egypt, and protests in Lebanon and Hong Kong. The US assassination of an Iranian general and the Iranian downing of an airliner caused Middle East tensions. Earthquakes in Puerto Rico prevented the swim team's annual trip in January. Protests in Colombia affected student travel in January. The UNCOP conference was planned to take place in Chile, but due to the state of emergency, the conference was relocated to Spain.

As the pandemic progressed, OCS had to monitor and respond to student travel plans to China, South Korea, Japan, and then Italy, and eventually all countries. OCS alerted the Swarthmore community to the need for regular and ongoing communication concerning the pandemic. Pat provided training to faculty and staff who take students abroad or for people paid to support students while abroad/off-campus: environmental studies in Hawai'i; athletics trips expected to South Africa, Costa Rica, and Puerto Rico; embedded study courses to Spain and Israel/Palestine; the UN climate change conference to Spain (moved from Chile), and Denise Crossan's program in Northern Ireland. OCS developed travel resources for the campus community. OCS, in conjunction with Bindu Jayne, and Campus Safety, conducted an OCS Title IX table top exercise.

Pat Martin and Jena Fioravanti prepared a new joint risk and safety assessment for applicants for College summer funding and met with Lang Opportunity Scholars and Davis Project for Peace applicants to advise them on IRB and risk considerations.

We expect that OCS will play an important and ongoing role in evaluating the risk levels of international travel and in identifying and encouraging global engagement opportunities that make take place physically, or virtually. With this in mind it is a good time to review whether the current insurance and risk assessment tools available are sufficient to the future tasks of assessing risk in our new reality of living with the specter of COVID-19.

Staffing: Rosa Bernard retired in June, 2019. We were successful in upgrading the position to Associate Director and Dr. Lotte Buiting was hired in this role in September. Sharlene Garcia continued as the Study Abroad Associate until she stepped down in January and Paul Chung '14 was hired in this position in February. Given the small OCS staff, each time a position is vacant it puts a significant burden on the remaining staff members. We requested that the Study Abroad Associate position be upgraded to a permanent Study Abroad Advisor position to recognize the professional nature of this position, and to provide more continuity of expertise and services over time. 2019-20 marked the last year of Jeremy Lefkowitz's three-year position as OCS Faculty Advisor.

<u>Technology</u>. OCS's web-based database, along with the College's web-based services, and the OCS travel program with Key Travel, made it possible to respond quickly to the pandemic and to easily adjust to working remotely. As a result of the pandemic, we evaluated how to present more information online. The staff created general information sessions online and developed content for an OCS Moodle site for future cohorts of students. OCS plans to convert OCS webpages from the Terra Dotta platform to the College website platform and design. OCS also plans to conduct a virtual study abroad fair for the fall that will take place over several days. OCS worked with ITS to develop an online system for the pre-estimation and final credit approval for transfer credit and will help students who may request transfer credit from study at other institutions.

Petitions were approved for study on the following programs: Bard in Berlin; Berklee School of Music in Valencia, Spain; IES program in Cape Town; Jacob University in Germany; Columbia University Reid Hall Paris; ISEP program at Kansai Gaidai University in Japan; NYU Paris; NYU Shanghai; the Umbria Institute; Smith in Geneva; and the CIEE program in Berlin. Study on a program in Colombia was not approved.

The committee discussed that it is now a trend that more students go abroad in the spring than the fall. This may be due in part to some programs that are available in the spring and not in the fall, like study at Oxford colleges. OCS needs to look into the impact this may have on campus.

The committee discussed the OCS returning student survey on access to mental health services abroad. OCS encouraged access to more services for students. David Ramirez, director of CAPS, stated the importance of understanding the limitations of what CAPS can do for students who are abroad. OCS also surveyed retuning students on the affordability of participating in cultural

activities. The provision of cultural activities varies greatly by program and OCS would like to assess the equity of what is provided to students across the various programs.

Due to the large number of students who study on the DIS programs in Copenhagen and Stockholm, and our relationship with the program, OCS is considering working with DIS on a jointly conducted assessment project that could include pre and post assessment elements facilitated by OCS. Additional discussions included uses of Off-Campus Study credit, a future OCS external review, plans to revamp the OCS website, the recommendation to create a link to global opportunities from the main College website, and plans to celebrate the 21 years of Swarthmore in Poland.

The committee discussed the name of the OCS study abroad program. Currently it is called the Swarthmore Semester/Year Abroad Program. Names discussed were the Swarthmore Off-Campus Study Program or Semester/Year Off-Campus Study Program. Ultimately OCS started using "Swarthmore Off-Campus Study Program". OCS hoped to prepare for an external review for 2020-21. The pandemic created so many challenges to the field of international education that a review did not make sense at this time.

OCS will need to develop strategies around advising students and preparing them to travel in our new reality. This will involve developing a new risk assessment and review process, and corresponding policies and procedures. Attention should be given to short-term study abroad options like the embedded study abroad courses. The mission statement of the OCS office should reflect the role that the office plays as a resource on these matters to the college community. The OCS committee discussed whether the name of the office captured this role sufficiently. In addition to developing an online transfer credit system for requests for credit for work that is not done when participating in the official Off-Campus Study program, OCS has agreed to provide advising and support to students who participate in the domestic study abroad exchange programs (previously done by the registrar's office). OCS plans to continue a review of mental health resources and support for students participating in OCS and will review services provided by current insurance providers.

II. Off-Campus Study Enrollment and Demographics

Exchanges: Due to travel restrictions imposed in January, 2020 at the early stages of the pandemic, one student who was supposed to study at the University of Tokyo was not able to attend. The exchange with the University of Tokyo is in balance. Swarthmore owes six semester places to Yale-NUS, and Ashesi owes one semester place to Swarthmore

Swarthmore-Administered and Swarthmore-Affiliated Study Abroad Programs:

- **1. HECUA.** Jeremy Lefkowitz served on the HECUA Board. In Spring 2020 one student participated in the Peace, Conflict, and Transition in Northern Ireland program.
- **2. Globalization, the Environment, and Society in Cape Town.** Carr Everbach serves as the faculty advisor for the program. Three Swarthmore and one Haverford student participated.
- **3. Central European Programs.** One student participated in the Central European Studies Program in Poland, coordinated by Professor Art McGarity who announced that Spring 2020 would be the last semester for these programs.
- **4. CASA Programs**. Two students participated in the Harvard CASA programs (one in Argentina and one in Chile). Twelve students participated in the Brown CASA programs (one in Cuba, one in Barcelona, and ten in Granada).

Embedded Study Abroad Programs:

- **1. Israel/Palestine.** Thirty-five students participated in the program organized by Professor Sa'ed Atshan. Professors Ben Berger, Keith Reeves, and Krista Thomason participated as faculty chaperones.

The table also shows when students have participated in more than one credit-bearing program. The summer data is for the summer following the indicated academic year. Students who participate in domestic approved programs are included.

Chart I. Off-Campus Study by Duration of Program




Chart II. Number of Student Off-Campus Study Semesters



The information in **Tables X** – **XIV** is provided by the Office of Institutional Research. Starting with the graduating class of 2017, two sets of data are provided: semester and year abroad participants, and semester and year abroad with embedded study abroad included.

Twenty percent of the graduating class of 2020 were first generation college participants and 42% participated in Semester/Year programs and 46% percent participated in Semester/Year Abroad & embedded programs combined.

International students comprised 11% (45 students) of the 2020 graduating class and 44% participated in Semester/Year programs and 47% participated in Semester/Year & embedded programs combined.

Women represented 53% of the 2020 graduating class and 60% participated in semester/year abroad programs. When embedded study abroad courses are included, 68% participated. Men represented 47% of the graduating class and had a 40% participation rate in semester/year abroad programs and a 32% participation rate when embedded courses are included.

Table XII a. shows the percent of students by self-reported race/ethnicity in each graduating class who participated in semester/year abroad programs and Table XII b includes participation in embedded study abroad courses. Students who reported as black or African-American non-Hispanic were the least well represented. When participation in embedded study abroad courses is included the representation rate rises to 43%.

Study abroad was popular among students who completed honors with 36% participation in semester/year abroad programs and 41% participation when embedded study abroad courses are include.

With Semester/Year Abroad and embedded programs combined, 38% of NSE majors participated in off-campus study along with 48% percent of humanities majors, 50% percent of social science majors, and 73% percent of interdisciplinary majors.

Chart III. Off-Campus Study Participation by World Region (Semester/Year) 2019-20




Chart IV. Off-Campus Study Participation by World Region (Semester/Year & Embedded Courses & Multi-country Programs Distributed by Country) 2019-20



V. Swarthmore College Funded Short-term International Activities

Due to the pandemic, after mid-March, 2020, college-sponsored travel was suspended. Table XXIV below shows eighteen students who participated in College-sponsored co-curricular international activities. When added to the off-campus study totals, students participated in at least 237 international activities in 2019-20, compared with 358 in 2018-19.

OCS creates travel registries for these activities, trains faculty and staff, creates handbooks for the faculty, and helps prepare students for the athletics and faculty-led programs through orientation programming. The students, along with faculty and staff who traveled with them, were registered in the travel registry, and were registered for CISI health and travel assistance insurance. Group programs were registered by OCS for the State Department STEP program.

OCS coordinates information concerning compliance with student enrollment with the Worth Health Center, Provost Office, the Lang Center, additional sponsoring departments, athletics, career services, and any other sponsors of student travel. The Worth Health Center staff provided travel health consultations for the students in the travel registry.

The following tables show international College-funded but noncredit-bearing student activities. After mid-March, 2020, the College did not permit such activities for the remainder of 2020.




